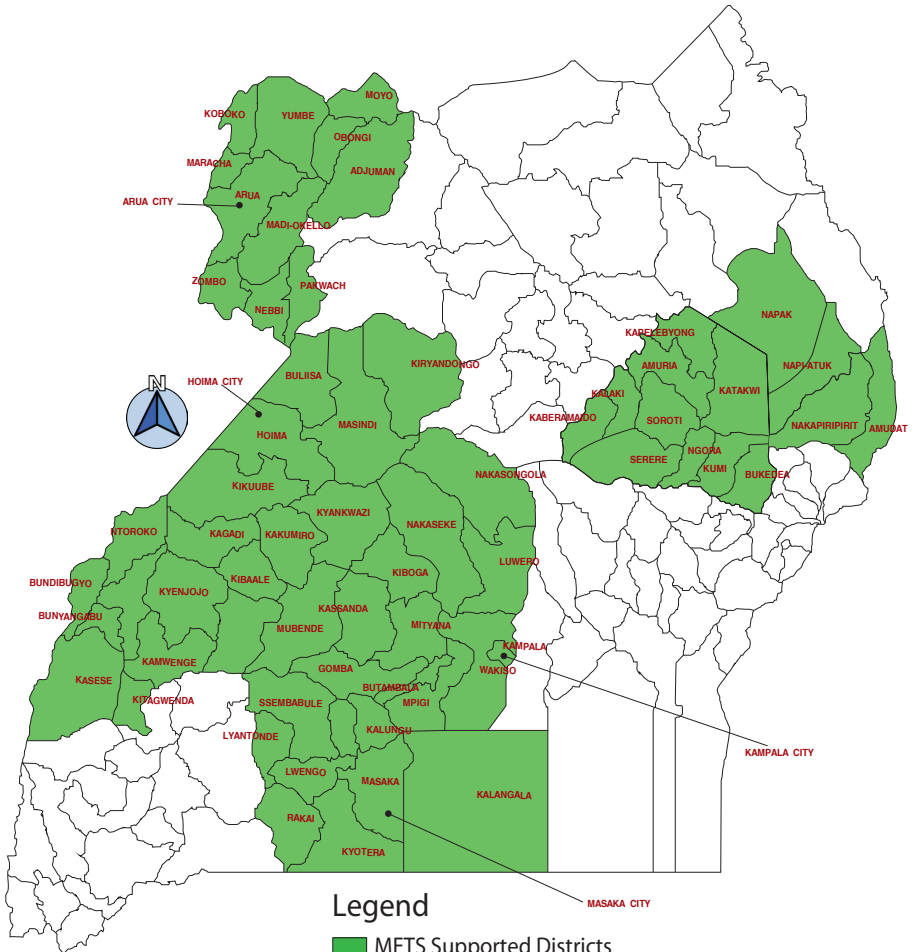

About METS

The Monitoring and Evaluation Technical Support (METS) Program is a five-year collaboration between the Makerere University School of Public Health (MakSPH), the University of California San Francisco (UCSF) and the Ministry of Health Uganda. The METS program emerged out of the growing recognition of the importance of evidence-based decision making for an AIDS Free Generation in Uganda. The United States President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) through the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) Uganda provides funding to the METS Program.

METS program builds on the current efforts to reinforce health sector capabilities to (1) coordinate an effective public health response to the HIV/AIDS epidemic; (2) improve monitoring and evaluation of HIV/AIDS programs, (3) enhance disease surveillance for priority conditions and 4) strengthening the national Health Management Information System (HMIS).

The overall purpose of METS Program is to establish coordinated and effective national and district systems for management of strategic information for HIV response. This will be done through coordinated efforts under the four project areas namely: Monitoring and Evaluation [M&E], District Led Programming [DLP], Clinical Surveillance [CS] and Health Information Management Systems [HIS].
